### **Young Leadership Seminar for Peace**

Humanizing the "other"...

On April 11-14 the Sulha held a four-day seminar for 32 young leaders in one of the most magnificent places in the Middle East, EcoMe – a green place near Jericho dedicated to meetings between Israelis and Palestinians. Participants were young people from all religions and nations in the region (age 18-22) who care deeply about our complex reality, where so many people fear the other, a situation which leads to hatred, racism and violence. The invitation was to come and meet the "other" and to share ideas on how to bring people to see each other as human beings...

What was most exciting was to see these young people become friends so quickly and initiate sessions to brainstorm about what they can do together to make a difference. Now, a month later, working groups have already met and initiated two projects: developing an Israeli-Palestinian program for school children and creating a Sulha day which they will organize and lead.
